~~BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:~~

This act shall be known and may be cited as "Dylan's Law".

A. Effective June 1, 2026, Service Oklahoma shall permit a driver license or state identification cardholder to voluntarily designate with the placement of a unique symbol that the person has

1 been diagnosed with epilepsy by a licensed physician. The
2 designation shall be used by a law enforcement officer or an
3 emergency medical professional to identify and effectively
4 communicate with a person who has been diagnosed with epilepsy and
5 shall not be used for any other purpose by any other person.

6 B. The cardholder may choose whether the voluntary designation
7 indicating that a person has been diagnosed with epilepsy, pursuant
8 to paragraph 1 of this section, shall be displayed on the driver
9 license or identification card or in the Oklahoma Law Enforcement
10 Telecommunications System (OLETS) in accordance with procedures
11 prescribed by Service Oklahoma. A holder of a driver license or
12 identification card who makes a voluntary designation pursuant to
13 this section shall have the opportunity to remove the designation at
14 any time.

15 SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 63 O.S. 2021, Section 1-106, as
16 amended by Section 1, Chapter 85, O.S.L. 2022 (63 O.S. Supp. 2024,
17 Section 1-106), is amended to read as follows:

18 Section 1-106. A. The State Commissioner of Health shall serve
19 at the pleasure of the Governor, and shall have skill and experience
20 in public health duties and sanitary sciences and shall meet at
21 least one of the following qualifications:

22 1. Possession of a Doctor of Medicine Degree and a license to
23 practice medicine in this state;

1 2. Possession of an Osteopathic Medicine Degree and a license
2 to practice medicine in this state;

3 3. Possession of a Doctoral degree in Public Health or Public
4 Health Administration; or

5 4. Possession of a Master of Science Degree and a minimum of
6 five (5) years of supervisory experience in the administration of
7 health services.

8 B. The Commissioner shall be exempt from all qualifications
9 enumerated in subsection A of this section if the Commissioner
10 possesses at least a master's degree and has experience in
11 management of state agencies or large projects.

12 C. The Commissioner shall have the following powers and duties,
13 unless otherwise directed by the Governor:

14 1. Have general supervision of the health of the citizens of
15 the state; make investigations, inquiries and studies concerning the
16 causes of disease and injury, and especially of epidemics, and the
17 causes of mortality, and the effects of localities, employment,
18 conditions and circumstances on the public health; investigate
19 conditions as to health, sanitation and safety of schools, prisons,
20 public institutions, mines, public conveyances, camps, places of
21 group abode, and all buildings and places of public resort, and
22 recommend, prescribe and enforce such measures of health, sanitation
23 and safety for them as the Commissioner deems advisable; take such
24 measures as deemed necessary by the Commissioner to control or

1 suppress, or to prevent the occurrence or spread of, any
2 communicable, contagious or infectious disease, and provide for the
3 segregation and isolation of persons having or suspected of having
4 any such disease; designate places of quarantine or isolation;
5 advise state and local governments on matters pertaining to health,
6 sanitation and safety; and abate any nuisance affecting injuriously
7 the health of the public or any community. Any health information
8 or data acquired by the Commissioner from any public agency, which
9 information or data is otherwise confidential by state or federal
10 law, shall remain confidential notwithstanding the acquisition of
11 this information by the Commissioner.

12 2. Be the executive officer and supervise the activities of the
13 State Department of Health, and act for the Department in all
14 matters except as may be otherwise provided in this Code; administer
15 oaths at any hearing or investigation conducted pursuant to this
16 Code; and enforce rules and standards adopted by the Commissioner.
17 All rules adopted by the Commissioner are subject to the terms and
18 conditions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

19 3. Appoint an Assistant State Commissioner of Health and fix
20 the qualifications, duties and compensation of the Assistant State
21 Commissioner of Health; and employ, appoint and contract with, and
22 fix the qualifications, duties and compensation of, such other
23 assistants, doctors, engineers, attorneys, sanitarians, nurses,
24 laboratory personnel, administrative, clerical and technical help,

1 investigators, aides and other personnel and help, either on a full-
2 time, part-time, fee or contractual basis, as shall be deemed by the
3 Commissioner necessary, expedient, convenient or appropriate to the
4 performance or carrying out of any of the purposes, objectives or
5 provisions of this Code, or to assist the Commissioner in the
6 performance of official duties and functions.

7 4. Cause investigations, inquiries and inspections to be made,
8 and hold hearings and issue orders pursuant to the provisions of the
9 Administrative Procedures Act, to enforce and make effective the
10 provisions of this Code, and all rules and standards adopted by the
11 Commissioner pursuant to law and the Commissioner or the
12 representative of the Commissioner shall have the right of access to
13 any premises for such purpose at any reasonable time, upon
14 presentation of identification.

15 5. Authorize persons in the State Department of Health to
16 conduct investigations, inquiries and hearings, and to perform other
17 acts that the Commissioner is authorized or required to conduct or
18 perform personally.

19 6. Except as otherwise provided by law, all civil and criminal
20 proceedings under this Code shall be initiated and prosecuted by the
21 district attorney where the violation takes place.

22 7. Issue subpoenas for the attendance of witnesses and the
23 production of books and records at any hearing to be conducted by
24 the Commissioner; and if a person disobeys any such subpoena, or

1 refuses to give evidence before, or to allow books and records to be
2 examined by, the Commissioner after such person is directed to do
3 so, the Commissioner may file a contempt proceeding in the district
4 court of the county in which the premises involved are situated, or,
5 if no premises are involved, of the county in which such person
6 resides or has a principal place of business, and a judge of such
7 court, after a trial de novo, may punish the offending person for
8 contempt.

9 8. Unless otherwise required by the terms of a federal grant,
10 sell, exchange or otherwise dispose of personal property that has
11 been acquired by the State Department of Health, or any of its
12 components, when such property becomes obsolete or is no longer
13 needed; any money derived therefrom shall be deposited in the Public
14 Health Special Fund.

15 9. Sell films, educational materials, biological products and
16 other items produced by the State Department of Health; and all
17 proceeds therefrom shall be deposited in the Public Health Special
18 Fund.

19 10. Revoke or cancel, or suspend for any period up to one (1)
20 year, any license or permit issued under or pursuant to this Code,
21 or by the Commissioner, when the Commissioner determines that ground
22 therefor as prescribed by this Code exists, or that the holder of
23 such license or permit has violated any law, or any of the
24 provisions of this Code, or any rules or standards of the

1 Commissioner filed with the Secretary of State, but the Commissioner
2 shall first afford the holder an opportunity to show cause why the
3 license or permit should not be revoked, canceled or suspended,
4 notice of such opportunity to be given by certified United States
5 Mail to the holder of the license or permit at the last-known
6 address of such holder.

7 11. Accept, use, disburse and administer grants, allotments,
8 gifts, devises, bequests, appropriations and other monies and
9 property offered or given to the State Department of Health, or any
10 component or agency thereof, by any agency of the federal
11 government, or any corporation or individual.

12 12. Be the official agency of the State of Oklahoma in all
13 matters relating to public health which require or authorize
14 cooperation of the State of Oklahoma with the federal government or
15 any agency thereof; coordinate the activities of the State
16 Department of Health with those of the federal government or any
17 department or agency thereof, and with other states, on matters
18 pertaining to public health, and enter into agreements for such
19 purpose, and may accept, use, disburse and administer, for the
20 office of the Commissioner or for the State Department of Health,
21 for any purpose designated and on the terms and conditions thereof,
22 grants of money, personnel and property from the federal government
23 or any department or agency thereof, or from any state or state
24 agency, or from any other source, to promote and carry on in this

1 state any program relating to the public health or the control of
2 disease, and enter into agreements for such purposes.

3 13. The State Commissioner of Health may appoint commissioned
4 peace officers, certified by the Council on Law Enforcement
5 Education and Training, to investigate violations of the Public
6 Health Code and to provide security to Department facilities.

7 14. Pursuant to Section 2 of this act, the State Commissioner
8 of Health shall appoint a Chief Medical Officer who reports directly
9 to the State Commissioner of Health.

10 15. The State Commissioner of Health shall, in consultation
11 with local and national organizations that provide education or
12 services related to epilepsy conditions, provide guidance to medical
13 doctors, osteopathic physicians, nurse practitioners, and physician
14 assistants who have the primary responsibility for treatment of a
15 person with epilepsy to assist in determining whether a patient is
16 at elevated risk for sudden unexpected death in epilepsy (SUDEP),
17 including, but not limited to, whether the patient has had
18 convulsive seizures, the frequency and recency of such seizures, and
19 whether the patient's symptoms have subsided in response to
20 medicinal or surgical treatment. The Chief Medical Examiner shall
21 provide to all employees of the Chief Medical Examiner's Office
22 information about sudden unexpected death in epilepsy (SUDEP).

23 SECTION 4. AMENDATORY 63 O.S. 2021, Section 1-118, is
24 amended to read as follows:

1 Section 1-118. A. The Division of Health Care Information is
2 hereby created within the State Department of Health.

3 B. The Division shall:

4 1. Collect from providers health care information for which the
5 Division has established a defined purpose and a demonstrated
6 utility that is consistent with the intent of the provisions of
7 Section 1-117 et seq. of this title;

8 2. Establish and maintain a uniform health care information
9 system;

10 3. Analyze health care data submitted including, but not
11 limited to, geographic mapping of disease entities;

12 4. Provide for dissemination of health care data to users and
13 consumers;

14 5. Provide for the training and education of information
15 providers regarding processing and maintenance and methods of
16 reporting required information;

17 6. Be authorized to access all state agency health-related data
18 sets and shall develop mechanisms for the receipt of health care
19 data to the Division or its agent; provided, however, all provisions
20 for confidentiality shall remain in place;

21 7. Provide for the exchange of information with other agencies
22 or political subdivisions of this state, the federal government or
23 other states, or agencies thereof. The Division shall collaborate
24 with county health departments, including the Oklahoma City-County

1 Health Department and the Tulsa City-County Health Department, in
2 developing city-county based health data sets;

3 8. Contract with other public or private entities for the
4 purpose of collecting, processing or disseminating health care data;
5 ~~and~~

6 9. Build and maintain the data base; and

7 10. In an effort to reduce deaths from sudden unexpected death
8 in epilepsy (SUDEP), develop an information program in the Injury
9 Prevention Service to be disseminated to the public and licensed
10 medical professionals to notify individuals with epilepsy of the
11 danger of SUDEP; and encourage the American Medical Association to
12 add a Current Procedural Terminology (CPT) Code for epilepsy
13 education by a medical service professional.

14 C. 1. The State Board of Health shall adopt rules governing
15 the acquisition, compilation and dissemination of all data collected
16 pursuant to the Oklahoma Health Care Information System Act.

17 2. The rules shall include, but not be limited to:

18 a. adequate measures to provide system security for all
19 data and information acquired pursuant to the Oklahoma
20 Health Care Information System Act,

21 b. adequate procedures to ensure confidentiality of
22 patient records,
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1 c. charges for users for the cost of data preparation for
2 information that is beyond the routine data
3 disseminated by the office, and

4 d. time limits for the submission of data by information
5 providers.

6 D. The Division shall adopt standard nationally recognized
7 coding systems to ensure quality in receiving and processing data.

8 E. The Division shall implement mechanisms to encrypt all
9 personal identifiers contained in any health care data upon
10 transmission to the State Department of Health, and all such data
11 shall remain encrypted while maintained in the Department's database
12 or while used by a contractor.

13 F. The Division may contract with an organization for the
14 purpose of data analysis. Any contract or renewal thereof shall be
15 based on the need for, and the feasibility, cost and performance of,
16 services provided by the organization. The Division shall require
17 any data analyzer at a minimum to:

18 1. Analyze the information;

19 2. Prepare policy-related and other analytical reports as
20 determined necessary for purposes of this act; and

21 3. Protect the encryption and confidentiality of the data.

22 G. The Board shall have the authority to set fees and charges
23 with regard to the collection and compilation of data requested for
24 special reports, and for the dissemination of data. These funds

1 shall be deposited in the Oklahoma Health Care Information System
2 Revolving Fund account.

3 H. The Division may accept grants or charitable contributions
4 for use in carrying out the functions set forth in the Oklahoma
5 Health Care Information System Act from any source. These funds
6 shall be deposited in the Oklahoma Health Care Information System
7 Revolving Fund.

8 SECTION 5. AMENDATORY 63 O.S. 2021, Section 945, is
9 amended to read as follows:

10 Section 945. A. When properly authorized, an autopsy shall be
11 performed by the Chief Medical Examiner or such person as may be
12 designated by him or her for such purpose. The Chief Medical
13 Examiner or a person designated by him or her may authorize arterial
14 embalming of the body prior to the autopsy when such embalming would
15 in his or her opinion not interfere with the autopsy. The extent of
16 the autopsy shall be made as is deemed necessary by the person
17 performing the autopsy.

18 B. A full and complete report of the facts developed by the
19 autopsy together with the findings of the person making it shall be
20 prepared and filed in the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner
21 without unnecessary delay. Copies of such reports and findings
22 shall be furnished to district attorneys and law enforcement
23 officers making a criminal investigation in connection with the
24 death.

1 C. Upon receiving a written, signed and dated records request,
2 a copy of the full and complete report of the facts developed by the
3 autopsy, together with the findings of the person making the report,
4 shall be released by the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner to the
5 public in the most expedient manner available or as requested by the
6 records requester and, under the following conditions, shall be
7 furnished to:

8 1. District attorneys and any law enforcement agency with
9 authority to make a criminal investigation in connection with the
10 death; provided, such copies shall not be shared with any other
11 entity unless otherwise provided by law;

12 2. The spouse of the deceased or any person related within two
13 (2) degrees of consanguinity to the deceased, unless the district
14 attorney or law enforcement agency making a criminal investigation
15 objects to the release of documents to any family member. District
16 attorneys and law enforcement agencies shall be prohibited from
17 objecting to the release of the full and complete autopsy report to
18 the family if the decedent was in state custody, in custody of law
19 enforcement or is deceased due to lethal action of a law enforcement
20 officer; and

21 3. Any insurance company conducting an insurer's investigation
22 of any insurance claim arising from the death of the individual upon
23 whom the autopsy was performed.

1 D. The full and complete report of the facts developed by the
2 autopsy, together with the findings of the person making the report,
3 shall be withheld from public inspection and copying for ten (10)
4 business days following the date the report is generated by the
5 Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, except as provided for in
6 subsection C of this section.

7 E. The Office of the Chief Medical Examiner shall produce a
8 summary report of investigation by the medical examiner at the same
9 time the full and complete report of the facts developed by the
10 autopsy, together with the findings of the person making the report,
11 is released to the parties listed in subsection C of this section.
12 The summary report of investigation shall be made available for
13 public inspection and copying without delay. Any person may obtain
14 a copy of the summary report of investigation in the most expedient
15 manner available or as requested by the records requester.

16 F. The summary report of investigation shall include, but not
17 be limited to, the following information, if known:

18 1. Decedent name, age, birth date, race, sex, home address,
19 examiner notified by name and title and including date and time,
20 location where decedent was injured or became ill, including name of
21 facility, address, city, county, type of premises, date and time;
22 location of death including name of facility, city, county, type of
23 premises, date and time, and location body was viewed by medical
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1 examiner including address, city, county, type of premises and date
2 and time;

3 2. If the death was a motor vehicle accident, whether the
4 decedent was the driver, passenger or pedestrian, and the type of
5 vehicle involved in the accident;

6 3. A description of the body, including but not limited to the
7 external physical examination, rigor, livor, external observations
8 including hair, eye color, body length and weight, and other
9 external observations, as well as the presence and location of
10 blood; and

11 4. The probable cause of death, other significant conditions
12 contributing to the death but not resulting in the underlying cause
13 given, manner of death, case disposition, case number, and name and
14 contact information of the medical examiner performing the autopsy,
15 including a signature and certification statement that the facts
16 contained in the report are true and correct to the best of their
17 knowledge and the date the report was signed and generated.

18 G. At the conclusion of the ten (10) business-day-period, the
19 full and complete report shall be made available as a public record
20 except when a district attorney or law enforcement agency with
21 authority to make a criminal investigation in connection with the
22 death declares that the full and complete report contains
23 information that would materially compromise an ongoing criminal
24 investigation. Such declaration shall be in writing to the Office

1 of the Medical Examiner and be an open record available from the
2 Office of Medical Examiner.

3 1. Upon such declaration, the district attorney or law
4 enforcement agency shall request from the appropriate district court
5 a hearing for an extension of time during which the full and
6 complete autopsy report, not including information in the summary
7 report, may be withheld.

8 2. When a request for an extension of time has been filed with
9 the court, the full and complete autopsy report in question may be
10 withheld until the court has issued a ruling on the requested
11 extension of time to release the autopsy report. Such requests for
12 an extension of time during which the autopsy may be withheld shall
13 be made on the grounds that release of the full and complete autopsy
14 report will materially compromise an ongoing criminal investigation.

15 3. Courts considering such requests shall conduct a hearing and
16 consider whether the interests of the public outweigh the interests
17 asserted by the district attorney or law enforcement agency.

18 4. If an extension of time is granted by the court, the initial
19 extension shall be ordered by the court for a period of six (6)
20 months. Subsequent extensions shall only be ordered after a hearing
21 by the court for an additional one year and cumulative time
22 extensions shall not exceed more than four (4) years and six (6)
23 months; provided, under no circumstance shall an extension of time
24 be granted by the court if the deceased person was in state custody,

1 in custody of law enforcement or was deceased due to lethal action
2 of a law enforcement officer.

3 5. In the event that six (6) months have expired from the date
4 of the initial release of the autopsy report without any person
5 being criminally charged in the case in question and release of the
6 autopsy or portions of the autopsy have been denied on the grounds
7 of materially compromising a criminal investigation, an appeal of
8 such denial may be made to the appropriate district court. Courts
9 considering appeals for temporarily withholding an autopsy report
10 shall conduct a hearing and consider whether the interests of the
11 public outweigh the interests asserted by the district attorney or
12 law enforcement agency. In response to such appeals, the district
13 court shall order that the autopsy report be made available for
14 public inspection and copying with no redaction, or shall order an
15 extension of time during which the autopsy report may be withheld
16 under the provisions of this section.

17 6. Any court order obtained pursuant to this subsection shall
18 be served upon the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner by the party
19 requesting or granted the extension by the court.

20 H. An order granting an extension of time shall be applicable
21 to the autopsy report for the duration of the extension; provided,
22 each subsequent time extension shall only be ordered by the district
23 court for an additional twelve-month period of time or less and
24 cumulative time extensions shall not exceed four (4) years and six

1 (6) months; provided, charges being filed against a person in the
2 case in question or an autopsy report being entered into evidence as
3 part of a criminal prosecution nullifies any granted extension of
4 time.

5 I. The opportunities to withhold an autopsy report or portions
6 of an autopsy report provided in this section shall expire in
7 totality four (4) years and six (6) months after the date the
8 autopsy report was generated, at which time the autopsy report
9 previously withheld on the grounds provided for in this section
10 shall be made available for public inspection and copying.

11 J. Nothing in this section shall prohibit a district attorney
12 or law enforcement agency with authority to make a criminal
13 investigation in connection with the death from immediately
14 releasing portions of information contained in the full and complete
15 autopsy report for the purposes of assisting with the criminal
16 investigation or apprehension of any person involved in a criminal
17 act that resulted in the death of another person.

18 K. After ten (10) business days from the release of the full
19 and complete report, nothing in this section shall prohibit the
20 spouse of the deceased or any person related within two (2) degrees
21 of consanguinity to the deceased who has received a copy of the full
22 and complete autopsy report from the Office of the Chief Medical
23 Examiner from authorizing the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner's
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1 office to release the full and complete autopsy report to any other
2 person subject to approval by the court.

3 L. When an autopsy of the body is conducted of a deceased human
4 who has epilepsy or a history of seizures, the report shall include
5 an investigation and determination as to whether the deceased
6 suffered a sudden unexpected death in epilepsy (SUDEP). In the
7 event the deceased did suffer a sudden unexpected death in epilepsy,
8 such information shall be noted on the death certificate and be
9 reported to the North American SUDEP Registry (NASR).

10 SECTION 6. This act shall become effective November 1, 2025.
