**Research Analysis**

The senate amendment to HB 1664 allows a board of county commissioners to attend conferences, trainings, press and social events, and proceedings of the Legislature, even if a quorum is present, provided that no official action is taken. For counties with a budget board, county commissioners and other elected officials are allowed to discuss budgetary matters provided that a quorum of the county budget board is not present and no official action is taken. Boards of county commissioners is added to the definition of a *public body* as it relates to the Oklahoma Open Meeting Act.

Additionally, the measure allows the Independent Living Council to conduct meetings and executive sessions via videoconferencing. All members of the council must be audible and visible and meeting notices must identify which members will be appearing remotely and which will be physically present. Any documents provided to the members for the regular meeting must be made immediately available to the public unless the documents are confidential or privileged under law. Lastly, any votes taken during a videoconferencing meeting must be recorded by a roll call vote.

**Fiscal Analysis**

The Senate amendment to HB 1664 does not materially alter the prior fiscal impact statement. The measure permits county commissioners to discuss and participate in certain matters and meetings. The measure deals exclusively with local county level government. Therefore, the measure is not anticipated to have a direct fiscal impact on the state budget or appropriations.
