Research Analysis

HB 2188, as introduced, requires the State Department of Health to coordinate with the State Department of Education in providing hearing screenings to students in Pre-k, kindergarten, 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 5th, 7th and 11th grades. Enrolled students are exempt from the screening if they provide their school with proof of a recently-passed hearing test within 30 days of the school's start date. If a child fails a screening, their parent is required to receive a recommendation for the child to undergo a comprehensive hearing exam. The measure lists details for equipment, methodology, and training for screeners.

Fiscal Analysis

HB 2188 requires the State Department of Health (OSDH), in coordination with the State Department of Education (SDE) to provide hearing examinations to students in pre-kindergarten, kindergarten, 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 5th, 7th, and 11th grades.

To implement the provisions of HB 2188, OSDH provided the following statement.

"In order for the Department to review and determine the ability of non-licensed hearing professionals to conduct screenings, review each curriculum submitted, approve trainers, and build/maintain a registry, the Department would need to:

- Contract with a hearing specialist to provide expertise regarding parameters to approve
 - Hearing screening training curricula (per "Hearing screening provider" definition)
 - Hearing screening trainers
- Establish a process to approve training curricula and trainers
- Devote staff time for the review of curricula and trainers; follow up with applicants regarding missing requirements
- Develop and maintain a registry of hearing screening providers"

Although the actual implementation cost will vary depending on the number of curricula/trainer applicants received annually, as well as the staff resources required for their review, OSDH officials anticipate a cost ranging from Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) annually. This cost would require additional appropriation, resulting in a fiscal impact of up to \$30,000 on the state budget.
