Research Analysis

The Senate Amendments for HB 2807 adds that "employee" means a natural person who serves in a role or provides services which would be reasonably expected to involve regular physical contact with medical marijuana products or waste. The Senate Amendments also adds that beginning June 1, 2025, non-infused pre-rolls and infused pre-rolls will be sold only in pre-packaged forms weighing no less than 1/2 gram to not more than 3 ounces. Licensed medical marijuana dispensaries will have until November 1, 2025, to sell or waste all current inventory that is not pre-packaged pursuant to this rule.

HB 2807 provides that OMMA will issue transporter licenses upon proper application by a licensee and determination by the Authority that the proposed site and facility are physically and technically suitable. The measure allows a licensed medical marijuana transporter to maintain and operate one or more warehouse provided they have applied for and received a permit for each warehouse location. The Authority will issue an annual permit for each warehouse location there will be no limit to the number of permits issued under a medical marijuana transporter license. If found that the site is not physically or technically suitable, the Authority will deny to the permit. All temporary storage in warehouses must be documented, tracked, and traceable in the state-mandated seed-to-sale tracking system. Medical marijuana transporting warehouses are required to maintain copies of inventory manifests and logs received from seven years from date of receipt.

Fiscal Analysis

HB 2807 clarifies statuary language regarding the permitting process for each warehouse location operated by a commercial transporter. The measure also closes a loophole in current statute by requiring all stored medical marijuana product be documented in the seed-to-sale system.

The Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority (OMMA) intends to utilize exiting resources to carry out the provisions of the measure. Therefore, HB 2807 is not anticipated to have a direct fiscal impact on the state budget or appropriations.

The Senate amendments do not change the fiscal impact of this measure from the previous House analysis.
