**Research Analysis**

The proposed policy committee substitute for HB 3239 allows the State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners to annually certify individuals in Pulsed Electromagnetic Field Therapy (PEMF) if they have completed the required instruction and hold certification from the Association of PEMF Professionals or a similar approved organization. To obtain this certification, applicants must pay a \$200 annual fee, submit an endorsement from a licensed veterinarian in good standing, and provide proof of liability malpractice coverage. They must also complete four hours of continuing education by July 1 each year for renewal.

The measure also requires a veterinarian using telehealth to have established the veterinarian-client-patient relationship through an in-person exam within the last 12 months, rather than solely through electronic means.

**Fiscal Analysis**

The proposed policy committee substitute to HB 3239 adds various statutory definitions regarding the veterinary profession as well as allows individuals to become certified in Pulsed Electromagnetic Field Therapy for their veterinarian practice. In order to gain certification, an individual must pay a certification fee of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to the State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners, a non-appropriated state entity. Any revenue generated from this fee is expected to be minimal; therefore, this measure has no direct fiscal or revenue considerations on state budgetary resources.
