**Research Analysis**

HB 3287, as introduced, requires every hospital and healthcare facilities in the state to post signage in conspicuous areas that tell people to notify staff if they are the victim of domestic abuse or human trafficking for commercial sex. Hospitals and health care facilities are required to develop protocols and procedures for reporting suspected or confirmed cases to appropriate law enforcement before the individual leaves the facility. The protocols must include procedures for assisting the victim and law enforcement in securing discharge or release without interference by or notification to the alleged perpetrator. The State Department of Health must promulgate formatting rules for the signage.

**Fiscal Analysis**

HB 3287 requires hospitals and health care facilities to post signage on domestic violence and human trafficking throughout their facility. These entities must also develop protocols for reporting cases to law enforcement. The State Department of Health (OSDH) is directed to promulgate rules specifying signage requirements.

Hospitals and health care facilities would be responsible for signage costs, and OSDH has confirmed that the measure's directives are feasible within existing resources. Therefore, HB 3287 is not expected to have a direct fiscal impact on the state budget or appropriations.
