**Research Analysis**

The proposed committee substitute for HB 3519 adds that submission and payment of the land reclamation fee will not be required if the applicant or a first degree relative has owned the land for at least five years prior to submitting the application. A first degree relative includes a mother, father, spouse, son, or daughter.

HB 3519 requires applicants for a medical marijuana business license seeking to operate a commercial growing operation to submit a land reclamation fee of \$2,000. This will not be required if it is verified that the land where the applicant intends to conduct their commercial growing operation has been owned by the applicant or a first degree relative for a minimum of five years. The Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority must verify that the person making the application is the same person that owns the land by examining recorded property deeds, property tax records, title insurance, or mortgage statements.

The measure also creates the "Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Land Reclamation Revolving Fund," which will contain funds from the land reclamation fees. Expenditures from the fund will be made upon warrants issued by the State Treasurer against claims filed as prescribed by law with the Director of OMES for approval and payment. Up to \$5 million of the funds may be used and expended for environmental remediation and redevelopment projects. The measure repeals [Section 2, Chapter 41, O.S.L. 2023 \(63 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 427.26\)](#) which required a bond to engage in commercial medical marijuana growing operations.

**Fiscal Analysis**

HB 3519 imposes a new land reclamation fee for certain medical marijuana commercial growers and creates the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Land Reclamation Revolving Fund. Fee revenue will support the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority's environmental remediation efforts, with any surplus deposited into the General Revenue Fund. Administrative and operational costs will be covered by fee revenue. As a result, HB 3519 is expected to have a neutral impact on OMMA and the state budget.

The proposed committee substitute does not change the fiscal impact from the previous analysis.
