**Research Analysis**

The proposed subcommittee substitute for HB 3904 removes the section in which the Oklahoma Medicaid Program is required to make presumptive eligibility determination for pregnant women who are applying to improve access to prenatal care and must allow prenatal care to be delivered while they wait for the full application to be processed. Additionally, the subpcs removes the section in which the Oklahoma Medicaid Program was required to provide coverage and reimbursement for self-measurement blood pressure monitoring services for pregnant and postpartum women.

HB 3904, as introduced, requires the Oklahoma Medicaid Program to reimburse for depression screening during pregnancy and the postpartum period. OHCA must apply for any federal waiver, state plan amendment, or other authority needed for implementation. The Oklahoma Medicaid Program must also reimburse for prenatal, delivery, and postpartum services in lieu of a global payment for maternity services. The measure requires the Oklahoma Medicaid Program to reimburse for medically necessary remote ultrasound procedures as long as the health care providers uses certain digital technology. The Oklahoma Medicaid Program must reimburse for home visitation services when they are provided by doulas, community health workers, and other qualified personnel.

**Fiscal Analysis**

HB 3904 clarifies which prenatal, delivery, and postpartum services are eligible for reimbursement under the state Medicaid program and modifies the payment methodology for reimbursing providers.

According to OHCA, this measure will have a budget-neutral impact as certain services are being reimbursed individually rather than through a bundled payment methodology. Therefore, HB 3904 is not anticipated to have a direct fiscal impact on the state budget.
