**Research Analysis**

HB 4109 requires medical personnel or employees of medical institutions to report any treatment of individuals with wounds, injuries, or illnesses caused by firearms, sharp instruments, poisoning, incendiary or explosive devices, or any suspicious or violent actions to the local police or county sheriff immediately. The report should include patient details and any information helpful for investigation, such as videos of the incident. Video and other records must be provided within 72 hours. The measure provides immunity from civil liability to the person making the report and exempts the report from the public record.

Garage keepers or employees who find evidence of a crime, such as bullet marks, blood stains, or other crime marks on motor vehicles, must report it immediately to local law enforcement, the county sheriff, or the Oklahoma Highway Patrol.

Failure to report is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of up to \$500, imprisonment in the county jail for up to 6 months, or both fine and imprisonment.
