**Research Analysis**

Engrossed SB 646 adds current elected federal officials to the provisions of the Oklahoma Judicial Security and Privacy Act of 2023 and renames the act to the Oklahoma Federal Official and Judicial Security and Privacy Act of 2025. In effect, state agencies are prohibited from publicly posting or displaying covered information of a currently elected federal official or their immediate family if a currently elected federal official files a written notice confirming their status as a currently elected federal official and requests that theirs and their immediate family's covered information be private. State agencies have 72 hours to remove any publicly posted or displayed covered information after receiving the written notice.

*Covered information* is defined in the measure as:

- Any personal information of a currently elected federal official such as date of birth, home and email address, personal phone number, social security number, driver license number, license plate number, and bank account information;
- Identity of children if under the age of 18 or 26 if they are living with the currently elected federal official;
- Name and address of the school or daycare attended by immediate family;
- Name and address of a place of worship attended by the currently elected federal official or immediate family; and
- Name and address of employment of immediate family.
