Research Analysis

The engrossed version of SB 930 provides that the State of Oklahoma will have concurrent jurisdiction with the United States over the United States military installation property outlined in this measure as it relates to enforcement of juvenile matters. Such concurrent jurisdiction shall be in effect upon the Governor's written acceptance of a request filed by the principal officer or an authorized representative of the United States who has supervision or control over the property where concurrent jurisdiction is sought. The measure provides that the Governor not accept a request unless it contains all information listed in the measure. If the Governor accepts a request, the written acceptance must state the elements of the request accepted. If the Governor accepts a request, the listed documentation must be filed with the Secretary of State and submitted to the person who requested concurrent jurisdiction. The state will not incur or assume any liability as a result of accepting concurrent jurisdiction. Upon establishing concurrent jurisdiction, a state agency or political subdivision is authorized to enter into a reciprocal agreement with a U.S. agency to designate duties related to concurrent jurisdiction between the parties.

Fiscal Analysis

Engrossed SB 930 provides that the State of Oklahoma shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the United States over the enforcement of juvenile matters at a certain United States military installation property. Concurrent jurisdiction is effective upon the Governor's written acceptance to a request filed by an authorized United States principal officer or representative having supervision or control over such property. The measure does not carry any fiscal or revenue considerations for the state. Therefore, the measure is not anticipated to have a direct fiscal impact on the state budget or appropriations.
