### Bill Summary and Fiscal Analysis:

SB 1260 removes child sex trafficking and human trafficking from the list of crimes that are subject to the 85% rule in Oklahoma. If a person is convicted of human trafficking, they will not be eligible for parole consideration or be able to obtain earned credits. The measure adds discharging a firearm at or into a building used for public and business purposes to the list subject to the 85% rule.

A review of current population data identified 32 inmates convicted and sentenced to Oklahoma Department of Corrections custody for these offenses. Two inmates serving sentences exceeding 50 years were excluded to establish a representative baseline. The remaining 30 inmates have an average sentence length of approximately 16.62 years. Under current law, these inmates would be eligible for release consideration after serving 85 percent of their sentence, or approximately 14.13 years. Under the proposed measure, these inmates would be required to serve an additional estimated 2.49 years in custody. Based on the marginal daily cost of incarceration, the estimated additional cost associated with extended incarceration for these 30 inmates is approximately \$582,000. This value is subject to change based on the number of future convictions.
