**Bill Summary and  
Fiscal Analysis:**

SB 1604 creates the Railroad Safety Act, which prohibits any person from seizing control over a train through force. Convicted persons will be guilty of a Class B1 felony and subject to a term of imprisonment not to exceed 20 years and/or a maximum fine of \$20,000. Any person that uses a deadly weapon to seize a train will be guilty of a Class B1 felony and subject to the same penalties. Any person convicted of assaulting personnel to seize control of the train will be guilty of a Class B4 felony and subject to a term of imprisonment not to exceed 10 years and/or a maximum fine of \$5,000. Any person convicted of discharging a firearm in a train or station will be guilty of a Class B4 felony and subject to the same penalties.

The Department of Corrections notes any incarceration increases would be dependent on the number of future convictions, and the agency is unable to determine a fiscal impact. The Department has provided the marginal/incremental cost of an incarcerated inmate, which is \$67.26 per day or \$24,549.90 per year.
