**Bill Summary and  
Fiscal Analysis:**

SB 2181 establishes a crime for any person who removes, entices, or withholds a minor child with the intent to interfere with the custody of the child. A person convicted of such acts will be guilty of a felony and subject to a maximum imprisonment of 5 years. The measure establishes a misdemeanor and a maximum fine of \$500 for any person convicted of enticing a child to leave the custody of the other parent. A second offense will be classified as a felony and subjects the person to a maximum term of imprisonment of 5 years. The measure also establishes a \$500 civil fine and doubles the fine amount for every subsequent offense.

The Department of Corrections notes any incarceration increases would be dependent on the number of future convictions, and the agency is unable to determine a fiscal impact. The Department has provided the marginal/incremental cost of an incarcerated inmate, which is \$67.26 per day or \$24,549.90 per year.
