8 PROPOSED POLICY COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE

9 An Act relating to agriculture; creating the Access  
10 to Healthy Local Food Act; defining terms; exempting  
11 direct-to-consumer sales of local food from all  
12 licensing, inspection, and other requirements if  
13 certain conditions are met; providing conditions;  
14 providing that a homemade food product producer may  
15 obtain a registration number upon payment of annual  
16 fee; allowing assigned registration number to be used  
17 on product labels instead of certain other  
18 information; allowing farm to sell and serve local  
19 food in certain circumstances; providing construing  
20 provision; providing the Department of Agriculture,  
21 Food, and Forestry authority to request proof of  
22 certain information from producer; providing fine for  
23 violation; providing that this act does not prevent  
24 counties from enacting certain ordinances; providing  
for codification; and providing an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

21 SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified  
22 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 5-4A.1 of Title 2, unless there  
23 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:  
24

1 This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Access to  
2 Healthy Local Food Act".

3 SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified  
4 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 5-4A.2 of Title 2, unless there  
5 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

6 As used in this act:

7 1. "Direct-to-consumer sale" means the sale of food directly to  
8 an informed end consumer by the producer at any location, including  
9 a farm, but excluding restaurants, not to exceed One Million Five  
10 Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) in gross sales in a single  
11 year;

12 2. "Farm" means a farm in this state that grows and harvests  
13 agricultural products, including fruit and vegetables, or that  
14 raises and produces dairy products;

15 3. "Informed end consumer" means a person who is purchasing  
16 local food for immediate consumption or consumption thereafter who  
17 has been given written notice that the product is exempt from state  
18 licensing and inspection in accordance with Section 3 of this act;

19 4. "Local food" means food that is produced in this state and  
20 sold in a direct-to-consumer sale. It excludes meat, poultry,  
21 seafood, unpasteurized dairy products, cannabis or marijuana  
22 products, and low-acid canned products;

23 5. "Produce" shall have the same meaning as defined in Section  
24 5-4.2 of Title 2 of the Oklahoma Statutes; and

1       6. "Producer" means the person or business entity that produced  
2 the food.

3       SECTION 3.       NEW LAW       A new section of law to be codified  
4 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 5-4A.3 of Title 2, unless there  
5 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

6       A. Direct-to-consumer sales of local food shall be exempt from  
7 all licensing, inspection, and other requirements of the State  
8 Department of Health and the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture,  
9 Food, and Forestry if the following conditions are met:

10       1. Any person producing the local food shall complete and pass  
11 food safety training from a list of providers, including ServSafe  
12 Food Handler Training, approved by the Department of Agriculture,  
13 Food, and Forestry. The food safety training shall be available to  
14 complete online and shall not exceed eight (8) hours in length;

15       2. If the food is not a whole, uncut, raw fruit or vegetable,  
16 the following information shall be provided in a legible format to  
17 an informed end consumer on the label or in writing at the point of  
18 sale:

- 19           a. the name and phone number of the producer,  
20           b. the physical address where the local food product was  
21           produced,  
22           c. a description of the local food,  
23           d. the ingredients of the local food in descending order  
24           of proportion,

1 e. a statement indicating the presence of any of the six  
2 most common allergens, including milk, eggs, peanuts,  
3 tree nuts, soy, and wheat, and

4 f. written notice stating, "This product is exempt from  
5 state licensing and inspection"; and

6 3. The producer complies with all local zoning and building  
7 code laws.

8 B. A homemade food product producer may obtain a registration  
9 number upon the payment of an annual fee of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00)  
10 to the Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry that is good  
11 for one (1) year from the date of its issue. The assigned  
12 registration number may be used on product labels instead of the  
13 producer's name, telephone number, and the physical address of the  
14 location where the local food product was produced.

15 C. A farm may sell and serve local food on the farm where the  
16 food is grown or produced to an informed end consumer using an agent  
17 or employee at the farm, provided the farm satisfies all other  
18 conditions provided in subsection A of this section.

19 D. Nothing in the Access to Healthy Local Food Act shall be  
20 construed to impede the State Department of Health in any  
21 investigation of a reported foodborne illness. Upon receipt of a  
22 consumer complaint, the Department of Agriculture, Food, and  
23 Forestry shall have the authority to request proof of completion of  
24 the food safety training and ensure a producer has complied with the

1 act's labeling and delivery requirements. The Department of  
2 Agriculture, Food, and Forestry may fine a producer who violates  
3 this act up to Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per violation.

4 E. Nothing in the Access to Healthy Local Food Act shall be  
5 construed to prevent counties from enacting ordinances regulating  
6 the sale of food, provided such ordinances do not conflict with the  
7 provisions of this act or impede or restrict the sale of products in  
8 compliance with state and federal law.

9 SECTION 4. This act shall become effective November 1, 2026.
