**Research Analysis**

The proposed policy committee substitute 1 for HB 3720 creates the "Access to Healthy Local Food Act". This measure exempts direct-to-consumer sales from licensing, inspection, and other requirements of the State Department of Health and the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry providing that the following conditions are met:

- Any person producing a local food product must complete and pass food safety training from a list of providers approved by the Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry. The training must be completable online and not exceed eight (8) hours total;
- Food products that are not whole, uncut, raw fruit, or raw vegetable must be labeled with the following:
  - The name and phone number of the producer;
  - The physical address where the local food product was produced;
  - A description of the local food;
  - The ingredients of the local food in descending order of proportion;
  - A statement indicating the presence of any of the six most common allergens, including milk, eggs, peanuts, tree nuts, soy, and wheat; and
  - Written notice stating, "This product is exempt from state licensing and inspection".
- Producers must be in compliance with all local zoning and building code laws.

This measure enables homemade food product producers to receive a registration number upon payment of an annual fee of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00). This registration number must be valid for one year after its date of issue. This assigned registration number can be used on a homemade food product label instead of providing the producer's name, telephone number, and physical address.

This measure permits an agent or employee of a farm growing or producing homemade food products to sell such products on the premises. Such sales must comply with the labeling requirements set forth in subsection (A) of this act.

Nothing in this act prohibits the State Department of Health and the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry from investigating foodborne illnesses. Upon completing an investigation, the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, And Forestry can impose a fine of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per violation.

This act does not prevent counties from enacting ordinances regulating the sale of food provided that such ordinances do not impede the sale of products in compliance with state and federal law.
