Research Analysis

The policy committee recommendation to HB 3720 creates the "Local Food Freedom Act". This measure:

- Excludes restaurants and businesses with sales exceeding One Million Five Hundred-Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000.00);
- Defines a *local food product* as food, including beverages, produced at a local food establishment excluding products containing alcohol, cannabis, or unpasteurized milk;
- Defines *non-time or temperature-controlled for safety* as food that does not require time or temperature control for safety to limit the rapid and progressive growth of infectious or toxigenic microorganisms;
- Defines *time or temperature-controlled for safety* as a food that requires time or temperature control for safety to limit infectious or toxigenic microorganism and is in a form capable of supporting rapid and progressive growth of infectious or toxigenic organisms;
- Requires local food products to be labeled as being produced at a facility exempt from government licensing and inspections and may contain allergens.
- Requires non-time or temperature-controlled for safety local food products to be sold:
 - By the producer directly to the consumer either in person, by Internet or phone; or
 - By the producer's agent or third party vendor.
- Requires time or temperature controlled for safety local food products to be sold:
 - By the producer directly to the consumer either in person or by Internet or phone; or
 - By direct delivery of local food products to the customer.
- Producers of time or temperature-controlled for safety local food products must complete and pass food safety training. The Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry must make a list of approved food safety training vendors available on its website.
- Provides that labeling requirements and local food products comply with federal law;
- Provides that specific information be included on food labels and that labels use 10 point font for legibility.
- Permits the Department of Health to conduct investigations into foodborne illnesses;
- Permits the Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry to investigate compliance with food safety training and gross sales requirements; and
- Sets a fine not exceeding Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for violations of this act.
