Research Analysis

HB 3833, as introduced, creates the "Oklahoma Autologous and Directed Blood Donation Act," which provides that a hospital or blood bank must comply with a physician's written order for a patient to use blood donated by the patient for future use or a directed blood donation for a scheduled medical procedure provided that certain criteria are met.

A hospital must permit the use of these blood donations when ordered by a physician, coordinate with the blood bank to ensure proper labeling, storage, and availability, and not restrict the use of these donations due to internal policy or preference when all criteria are satisfied. A blood bank must make these donations available in accordance with federal and state standards, comply with the physician's orders, and ensure proper labeling and tracking to maintain the integrity of the units. A hospital or blood bank may charge administrative fees associated with these blood donations. A hospital or blood bank is not liable for the unavailability of the requested unit if the donor fails eligibility screening, the donation is deemed unsuitable, the unit is expired or subject to storage limitations, or circumstances beyond the facility's control. he State Department of Health must make rules as necessary within 180 days of the effective date as long as the rules do not impose requirement beyond existing federal ones and as long as they consult with relevant stakeholders.

Fiscal Analysis

HB 3833 creates the Oklahoma Autologous and Directed Blood Donation Act, requiring hospitals and blood banks to follow physician orders for patients to use their blood or donated blood for medical procedures, provided all eligibility and safety requirements are met.

The measure directs the State Department of Health (OSDH) to promulgate rules. OSDH has confirmed existing funding will cover implementation, and no additional costs are anticipated to promulgate necessary rules. Therefore, HB 3833 is not expected to have a direct fiscal impact on the state budget.
