Research Analysis

The Policy committee substitute to HB 4104 adds three crimes to the classification list as B5 crimes. The crimes are:

- Second and subsequent offense of watching, gazing, or looking upon a person in a clandestine manner for prurient interests;
- Using photographic, electronic, or video equipment in clandestine manner for prurient interests; and
- Second or subsequent offense of using photographic, electronic, or video equipment in clandestine manner to capture image of private area without consent.

The measure requires persons convicted of these offenses to register as a sex offender. The measure allows the person to petition to be removed from the requirements of the Sex Offender Registration Act after 5 years if the offender has not been arrested or convicted of any other misdemeanor or felony offense.

The measure repeals a previously amended version of [Title 57, Section 582](#) to avoid duplicate sections issue.

Fiscal Analysis

This measure expands the list of B5 felony crimes to include certain offenses of a sexual nature. Persons convicted of such offenses will be required to register as a sex offender and, upon conviction, be punishable by imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections (DOC) for a term not more than 5 years, or by a fine not to exceed \$5,000, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Any resulting change to the revenues collected by the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) or change in the costs incurred by the Department of Corrections (DOC) are expected to be immaterial and/or absorbed by the agencies. Therefore, this measure in its current form is anticipated to be budget neutral.
