Research Analysis

The policy committee recommendation to HB 4106 lowers the felony threshold for grand larceny from \$1,000 to \$900. The measure also provides that a person convicted of a third or subsequent offense of petit larceny is guilty of a felony punishable by imprisonment for up to 2 year, a fine of up to \$1,000 of both fine and imprisonment.

Fiscal Analysis

HB4106 lowers the threshold for grand larceny from \$1,000 to \$500, and sets forth that any person convicted of a third or subsequent offense of petit larceny shall be guilty of a felony punishable by imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections (DOC) for a term not exceeding 2 years, or a fine not exceeding \$1,000, or by both such fine and imprisonment. This may have an increase on persons convicted of such offenses, however the frequency of a new crime is not knowable. Any resulting change to the revenues collected by the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) or change in the costs incurred by the Department of Corrections (DOC) are expected to be immaterial and/or absorbed by the agencies. Therefore, this measure in its current form is anticipated to be budget neutral.

The POLAMD1 to HB4106 increases the threshold for grand larceny from \$500 to \$900. This does not change the fiscal impact of the measure as described above.

The POLREC to HB4106 adopts the POLAMD1, and the fiscal impact remains to be as described above.
