1 STATE OF OKLAHOMA 2 1st Session of the 60th Legislature (2025) 3 SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 11 By: Guthrie of the Senate 4 and 5 Lepak of the House 6 7 8 AS INTRODUCED 9 A Concurrent Resolution stating legislative intent to reduce the individual income tax rate by 0.25% point; 10 urging fiscal restraint in agency reductions to protect taxpayer services; recognizing historic state 11 savings; emphasizing responsible governance and the will of the people; reaffirming the principles of 12 limited government and economic liberty; and directing distribution. 13 14 15 WHEREAS, the State of Oklahoma currently maintains over \$5 16 billion in reserve savings, with the majority of those funds readily 17 available, placing the state in its strongest financial position in 18 history; and 19 WHEREAS, Oklahoma families continue to bear the burdens of 20 inflation and economic uncertainty, and the state has a 21 responsibility to return excess revenue to the hardworking taxpayers 22 when fiscally feasible; and 23

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WHEREAS, tax relief will keep more money in the pockets of
Oklahomans, allowing them to spend and invest in their communities,
supporting local businesses and strengthening the state economy; and
WHEREAS, Oklahomans know best how to spend their money, and the
government should not penalize individuals for their productivity
through excessive taxation; and

WHEREAS, Oklahomans who get up every day to go to work should not be punished by an income tax as a tax on work is a tax on the backbone of our state; and

WHEREAS, many state agencies are being funded for vacant positions that have gone unfilled for months or years, resulting in millions of dollars in unnecessary appropriations with no return for the taxpayer; and

WHEREAS, bloated agency administrations and layers of bureaucracy reduce economic efficiency and make it harder for state government to fulfill its most essential responsibilities; and

WHEREAS, the Governor has proposed a 0.5% point income tax cut to be offset by a 2% across-the-board reduction to all agencies and elimination of long-vacant jobs; and

WHEREAS, the bloat and inefficiencies in government would allow for across-the-board cuts without the risk of undermining core services such as education, public safety, and health care, as some agencies have suggested they could be cut by as much as 10%; and

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population growth, and it is time to return to a limited government focused on its core functions, not expanding bureaucracies; and WHEREAS, the majority of the members of the Legislature were elected on platforms promising to reduce waste, cut taxes, and deliver a government that serves the people, not itself; and WHEREAS, polling and public feedback consistently show that Oklahomans overwhelmingly support a tax cut, and expect their

WHEREAS, government growth in recent years has outpaced

WHEREAS, Oklahoma has responsibly reduced its top individual income tax rate from a high of 7.0% in prior decades to the current rate of 4.75%, and during that time, overall state revenues have continued to grow due to a stronger economy, population gains, and a broader tax base; and

WHEREAS, a 0.25% point tax cut is a fiscally responsible middle ground that reflects conservative values, honors the intent of taxpayers, and maintains the long-term stability of state finances.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE 1ST SESSION OF THE 60TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN:

THAT the Legislature hereby expresses its intent to enact a 0.25% reduction in the individual income tax rate during the 1st Regular Session of the 60th Oklahoma Legislature.

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THAT the Legislature encourages immediate tax relief as a means to strengthen economic growth, empower working families, and reduce dependency on the government by letting Oklahomans keep more of what they earn.

THAT the Legislature urges targeted agency budget reductions so that vital public services and frontline needs are protected while bureaucratic overhead is eliminated.

THAT the Legislature calls for agency accountability, including a thorough review of appropriations for persistently unfilled fulltime positions, and directs efforts to streamline management, reduce overhead, and eliminate waste.

THAT the Legislature reaffirms its commitment to limited, efficient government focused on protecting rights, delivering core services, and returning surplus dollars to the people.

THAT copies of this resolution be distributed to the Governor, the Director of the Office of Management and Enterprise Services, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and be made available to the public.

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
