9	A Concurrent Resolution proclaiming April 23, 2025, as the 26th Annual Oklahoma 4-H Day at the Capitol.

12	WHEREAS, the youth of Oklahoma and the nation represent the
13	future, and their development is paramount to the well-being and
14	prosperity of communities across the country; and
15	WHEREAS, for a quarter of a century, this annual celebration of
16	4-H Day at the Capitol provides an opportunity for club members to
17	share their 4-H stories with state leaders; and
18	WHEREAS, 4-H is the youth development component of the Oklahoma
19	State University and Langston University Extension programs geared
20	toward young people ages 5 to 19; and
21	WHEREAS, for nearly 120 years, 4-H has helped thousands of club
22	
	members develop life skills such as leadership, decision-making,
23	time management, and civic engagement; and

1 WHEREAS, programming in 4-H is changing continually to meet the 2 needs of today's youth; and 3 WHEREAS, the Oklahoma 4-H Youth Development Program reinforces 4 the learn-by-doing philosophy through hands-on, experiential 5 learning opportunities; and 6 WHEREAS, 4-H reaches more than 180,000 participants each year 7 through membership, project clubs, and school enrichment; and 8 WHEREAS, Oklahoma State University Extension and Langston 9 University 4-H'ers participate in STEM, civic engagement, healthy 10 living, leisure sciences, natural resources, and agriculture 11 programs; and 12 WHEREAS, dedicated and committed volunteers, mentors, and 13 supporters play a pivotal role in the success of the organization; 14 and 15 WHEREAS, youth who participate in 4-H are four times more likely 16 to make contributions to their communities; and 17 WHEREAS, there are nearly 1,200 adult volunteer leaders who 18 serve as mentors and provide leadership while fostering positive 19 adult/youth partnerships; and 20 WHEREAS, youth volunteers develop life skills by serving as 21 mentors/role models and provide leadership to club members; and 22 WHEREAS, 4-H provides programming beyond traditional 23 agricultural projects, including food and nutrition, horticulture, 24

1 photography, robotics, community development, companion animals, and 2 more; and 3 WHEREAS, youth participating in 4-H are encouraged to share with 4 state leaders how 4-H is making communities better through project 5 work and service learning activities; and 6 WHEREAS, adult volunteer leaders and club members combined 7 annually contribute more than 100,000 volunteer hours to the 8 betterment of Oklahoma; and 9 WHEREAS, 4-H members continue to work together and follow the 10 motto "To Make the Best Better" in all that they do; and 11 WHEREAS, the annual Oklahoma 4-H Day at the Capitol provides an 12 opportunity to share with state leaders the positive impact they 13 have on their communities, counties, and state. 14 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE 1ST SESSION 15 OF THE 60TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 16 CONCURRING THEREIN: 17 THAT the Oklahoma Legislature hereby proclaims April 23, 2025, 18 as the 26th Annual Oklahoma 4-H Day at the Capitol, celebrating 19 youth who have made an impact on the community and who are stepping 20 up to the challenges of a complex and changing world, and continuing 21 to share the positive impact Oklahoma 4-H has on our youth, our 22 communities, and our state because "We Are Oklahoma 4-H." 23
